## EQUITABLE ACCESS TO RIGOROUS LEARNING

## EQUITY, ACCELERATION, AND THE NIET TEACHING AND LEARNING STANDARDS

Learn how the NIET Teaching and Learning Standards rubric can support school leaders to address equity challenges and accelerate student learning.

#### Participants will:

- Describe the impact high-quality instructional practices have on building equity in schools and learning acceleration
- Explain how the intentional elevation of the NIET Teaching and Learning Standards in classroom and job-embedded professional development support the inclusion of equitable practices and shift classrooms from remediation to acceleration
- Discuss opportunities to support, communicate, and elevate the connections between the NIET Teaching and Learning Standards, equity, and learning acceleration

## EQUITY WALKS: EXAMINING STUDENT ACCESS TO LEARNING ACCELERATION

This session will provide participants with tools to support equitable practices and student access to accelerated learning to ensure the integrity of challenging work for all students.

#### Participants will:

- Unpack the instructional leadership team's (ILT) role in gathering evidence of students' access to learning acceleration
- Practice applying prioritized look-fors to identify evidence of opportunities for learning acceleration
- Generate ideas for teacher feedback and support to increase learning acceleration

## ANALYZING STUDENT WORK TO ENSURE EQUITABLE ACCESS TO RIGOROUS LEARNING

Attend this session to learn how student work products can be used to ensure all learners have the opportunity to productively engage with grade-level content.

#### Participants will:

- Understand the role that student work analysis plays in learning acceleration for all students
- Learn and practice a student work analysis process to ensure that students are engaged with rigorous, standards-aligned tasks
- Plan for implementation at the school or district level



# STRONG SCHOOL CULTURE, CHARACTER, AND ENVIRONMENT

#### LEVERAGING THE NIET TEACHING AND LEARNING STANDARDS RUBRIC TO INCREASE INTRINSIC MOTIVATION AND DRIVE OWNERSHIP

Educators will connect research-based strategies for motivation to NIET's foundational resources, exploring how the rubric supports educators to build strategies to support intrinsic motivation into their instruction.

#### Participants will:

- Connect intrinsic motivation to student ownership and achievement
- Identify and utilize descriptors from the NIET
   Teaching and Learning Standards Rubric that
   support the development of intrinsic motivation
- Develop intentional, intrinsic motivational strategies and protocols to foster a culture of learning that positively impacts student outcomes

## YOU GO FIRST: STUDENT OWNERSHIP AND AN INCLUSIVE ENVIRONMENT

What does it mean to be inclusive? Educators will leave this session understanding what it looks like to use coaching and cluster/PLCs as a lever to strengthen the classroom and/or school environment and leverage the NIET rubric's Environment domain to foster student ownership.

#### Participants will:

- Explain the connection between inclusive practices, environment, and student ownership
- Identify and explain how instructional practices embedded in the Environment domain help foster an inclusive learning environment for students
- Brainstorm strategies to model for teachers that create more equitable and inclusive classroom environments for all students — making it a safe and inviting place for all students to be successful

## PRINCIPAL PRACTICES THAT FOSTER A STRONG SCHOOL ENVIRONMENT

Building a strong school culture that creates opportunities for all students to feel welcome, grow, and thrive is essential. This session will help leaders to embed practices that strengthen their environment and support students' academic growth and character development.

#### Participants will:

- Analyze current practices to determine where there may be opportunities to strengthen the school environment
- Reflect on what effective principal leadership practices look like and sound like when it comes to building a strong environment
- Develop action steps for teaching and modeling character in your school that will strengthen the learning environment

## EXCELLENT INSTRUCTION AND STUDENT OWNERSHIP

## STUDENT OWNERSHIP: THE ULTIMATE GOAL OF ACCELERATION

This session brings together student ownership and learning acceleration as a vision for instructional excellence. Join us to learn how to support the instructional practices needed to bring this vision to life.

#### Participants will:

- Distinguish between student engagement and student ownership
- Determine how learning acceleration is impacted by student engagement and student ownership
- Construct a vision for supporting student ownership practices to elevate learning acceleration

## ESTABLISHING A STUDENT OWNERSHIP CULTURE BY UTILIZING SUCCESS CRITERIA

In this session, leaders at all levels will define next steps for establishing a culture of student ownership by learning to see and hear evidence of student ownership.

#### Participants will:

- Recognize and discuss traits of a learner and describe accelerated learning
- Describe how and why student interaction with success criteria builds the foundation for student ownership
- Collect evidence to explain how to "see and hear" ownership of learning
- Prepare to coach strategies that engage students with success criteria to accelerate learning

## THE ILT'S ROLE IN CULTIVATING STUDENT OWNERSHIP

Join us to unpack using data, habits, and choice to create a ripple effect of ownership that starts with the instructional leadership team and impacts teachers and students.

#### Participants will:

- Explain why an ILT's ownership of learning is critical to advancing the school toward student ownership
- Explore how an ILT uses data, habits, and choice to elevate leader ownership of learning
- Develop a plan of action anchored in data, habits, or choice, which will elevate the ILT's ownership of learning and move the school toward student ownership

## LEARNING

## SUPPORTING COLLECTIVE EFFICACY FROM APPLICATION TO EVALUATION

Explore how NIET's meeting protocols can help ensure transfer of professional learning to classrooms and build a culture of collective efficacy.

#### Participants will:

- Evaluate current practices and explore processes for assessing transference of professional learning to the classroom
- Examine the role of school leaders to support teachers in transferring professional learning into effective instructional practices
- Identify strategies to increase transference of professional learning to effective instructional practice

## DISMANTLING THE CULTURE OF NICE TO LEVERAGE COLLECTIVE LEADER EFFICACY

This session will focus on the impact of intentionally recognizing, building, and leveraging leader strengths to positively impact teacher effectiveness and student achievement.

#### Participants will:

- Develop an understanding of collective leader efficacy and its impact on leadership teams, teachers, and students
- Reflect on and identify the conditions and mindsets that leaders need to support continuous improvement
- Create a plan to accelerate adult learning by leveraging the strengths of the leaders on their team

## THE COMMITMENT TO STUDENT LEARNING FROM DISTRICT TO SCHOOL TO CLASSROOM

Alignment is key when it comes to providing support for student learning at the district and school levels. This session will explore structures to help leaders create alignment from the district to the classroom level.

#### Participants will:

- Explain how each level of leadership from the classroom to district offices is inter-connected to support teachers in meeting student learning needs
- Describe how alignment of all of the leadership's work within a district leads to learning acceleration
- Define how the quality of learning for every group is driven by leadership meetings using the Five Steps for Effective Learning



## EFFECTIVE USE OF INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS AND CURRICULUM

## YOU'VE GOT TO MOVE IT, MOVE IT! LEADER MOVES TO STRENGTHEN CURRICULUM IMPLEMENTATION

High-quality curriculum and effective leadership practices: This session explores the powerful connection between the two and highlights specific leadership moves that enable teachers to implement curriculum effectively.

#### Participants will:

- Identify specific leadership practices conducive to high-quality curriculum implementation
- Articulate where they are in the implementation process
- Set next steps that prioritize school and/or district needs

# USING STUDENT WORK TO DIAGNOSE TEACHER STRENGTHS AND LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES WITHIN THE CURRICULUM

This session uses tasks and student work to determine where teachers fall along the teacher learning progression for curriculum and gives leaders practice in developing next steps for supporting curriculum implementation.

#### Participants will:

- Analyze student work to diagnose teacher strengths and opportunities within high-quality curriculum
- Identify critical supports district and school leaders can provide to teachers so all students receive access to high-quality curriculum
- Develop next steps for supporting effective implementation of curriculum

## EMPOWERING TEACHERS THROUGH INSTRUCTIONAL PREPARATION

Teachers are empowered when provided with opportunities to collaborate. This session focuses on how PLCs and clusters support implementation of high-quality curriculum.

#### Participants will:

- Articulate the ways in which instructional preparation using high-quality curricula is different than traditional lesson planning
- Apply a set of instructional preparation guiding questions to existing materials to better ensure delivery of daily lessons accelerates learning for all
- Articulate how supporting teachers with instructional planning in PLCs/clusters accelerates the impact of high-quality curriculum

## BUILDING NEW AND ASPIRING TEACHER SUPPORTS

## ELEVATING COACHING EFFECTIVENESS FOR ASPIRING AND NOVICE EDUCATORS

This session will help educators who support new and aspiring teachers to feel more confident and equipped to lead coaching conversations that result in clear next steps to improve instruction.

#### Participants will:

- Identify the components of the POP cycle (preobservation coaching conversation, observation; post-observation coaching conversation)
- Analyze a coaching conversation that includes student work
- Construct a guided practice opportunity grounded in the Aspiring Teacher Rubric to strengthen informal coaching and evaluation practices

## STRENGTHENING PIPELINE PARTNERSHIPS: SPENDING TIME IN CLASSROOMS TOGETHER

Learning walks can support strong partnerships between K-12 schools and teacher preparation programs. Join this session for more on how to engage in learning walks and use data to inform teacher learning.

#### Participants will:

- Identify how spending time in classrooms together builds a shared understanding to accelerate aspiring and novice teacher learning
- Recognize learning walks as a strategy to inform collaborative conversations and decisions about teacher learning
- Debrief a learning walk to explore making decisions about teacher learning and plan for next steps to support aspiring and novice teacher learning

## MAKING NEW TEACHER MENTORING MORE EFFECTIVE

In this session, educators will reflect on opportunities to improve mentoring for new teachers and create a plan to implement new strategies to increase the effectiveness of mentoring.

#### Participants will:

- Discuss challenges that impede effective mentoring and identify action steps
- Analyze three key strategies to support effective mentoring structures for new teachers

#### **PANEL SESSIONS**

## WHY CURRICULUM IMPLEMENTATION MATTERS NOW

Learning acceleration is critically dependent on ensuring teachers are equipped with access to high-quality curriculum, a deep understanding of how to use it, and ongoing coaching and collaboration to differentiate instruction and meet student needs. Leaders will discuss how to prioritize high-quality curriculum implementation and strategies for ensuring teachers are supported to blend the "what" of curriculum with the "how" of great instruction.

Bubble sessions are an opportunity for educators to observe a collaborative learning opportunity being modeled by school and district leaders and facilitated by NIET leaders. In these sessions, educators will be seated around a center table where the meeting will take place with participants surrounding them in a "bubble" to observe. Throughout the meeting, there will be "step outs" where participants will reflect on what they are observing and facilitators will unpack what they are learning.

These three sessions will each highlight a different collaborative learning opportunity: cluster/PLC meeting, instructional leadership team (ILT) meeting, and district instruction leadership team (D-ILT) meeting

#### Participants will:

- Identify key elements of a high-quality cluster/ PLC, ILT, or D-ILT meeting that build educator capacity to improve instructional practice
- Analyze how cluster/PLC, ILT, or D-ILT meeting structures can accelerate educator impact
- Determine next steps for creating or strengthening cluster/PLC, ILT, or D-ILT meeting structures in their district or school
